
Character


Through the experiences of camp, as well as the teaching and example of our Christian staff, we provide your students a unique opportunity to grow in character, equipping them to flourish as they continue to develop.

Resilience

The activities and sessions on camp allow students to get out of their comfort zone and build resilience, so they may persevere in the face of the challenges life may throw at them.

Students are able to establish friendships, shine as leaders, discover their potential, and explore the Christian faith, building their hope for now and into the future.





Our camps are run by a dedicated team of approachable, fun and qualified leaders. They are the main reason schools keep returning year after year.

Our leaders run camp from daybreak to bedtime and make intentional efforts in getting to know each student. By spending each meal time, free time and activity with the students, our leaders build a trusting camp community - giving students the confidence to push themselves to go further. On camp, students are also given the opportunity to explore their beliefs alongside our leaders, who are great Christian role models.

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The enthusiasm, energy and participation of the CRU leaders is amazing. The rapport they immediately build with the students is impressive and is remembered for a long time afterwards. They are totally involved, from the moment we arrive until we depart. An ideal environment for exploring faith

During camp, students will have the chance to open the Bible and talk about the claims that Jesus makes about Himself, in a non-confronting and supportive environment.



Engaging Christian discovery sessions

Christian discovery sessions are tailored for each group's age and faith background. These sessions focus on the central message of the Bible, and seek to encourage every student to explore faith, God and Christianity for themselves. These presentations involve engaging elements such as puppets, skits, songs, challenges, talks and activities.



Supportive leaders

Students also have the opportunity to ask their leaders questions about their faith. The leaders are trained in Christian ministry and are sensitive to the varied backgrounds of students.



Focus on the whole person

Combined with outdoor education challenges, this approach to students' character development allows them to discover more about themselves and God who loves them deeply.



Estelle Stelzer is currently Head of Junior School (Transition to Year 4) at Macarthur Anglican School, located in picturesque Cobbitty in South Western Sydney. For many years Estelle has partnered with CRU Educational Camps - let's find out why she keeps returning!

Q: When did you start partnering with CRU for your school camps?

A: I've been teaching for about 28 years and first came across CRU Educational Camps back at the very start of my career. I've been running school camps with CRU ever since!

Q: What keeps you coming back to CRU Educational Camps?

A: CRU offers camps that are professionally run. The team are always attentive to detail and organization is always clear. The team is trained with their outdoor abilities - things that I can't offer in a school context, CRU can offer. Also, safety is paramount - the staff are very clear on their instructions for children and have procedures in place to ensure they are safe.

I always tell parents that that their children will be well cared for, and how things will go smoothly. And every time, camp has run smoothly!

Q: Can you describe your booking experience with us?

A: The communication is fabulous! The process is just very fluid and there's lots of communication – it's really helpful because it keeps me up to date and on top of everything. As soon as we've finished a camp, feedback is given and taken on board. Then we start planning the next year and make sure we've got our booking dates locked in a couple years ahead! We love to know we've got what we want for our next camp.

Q: What can you expect on a day of camp?

A: Everyone's camp will be different, but at ours you can expect that the leaders will get the children up in the morning - meaning that you can have a shower if you'd like to! You can expect good food and lots of it, that the leaders are engaged with the children, and that things will be organized and safe.

You can expect that the kids are kept busy, but not exhausted, and that there will be opportunities for the children to have some downtime and some free play.

Q: What is your experience with our camp leaders?

A: The team is very personable and the leaders genuinely want to engage with the children - they want to know our kids and understand them!

They have conversations with the children, sit next to the children, eat meals with children, talk about life with them and build relationships. The children love the leaders, they think that they're great! The leaders ask us about the children so that they can make appropriate adjustments, whether it's for a diagnosis they have or any behaviours they need to consider. They really want to help the children succeed in the activities. They are also joyous and enthusiastic and the students feel that energy, which is great.

Q: How are the activities on camp?

A: Both the students and teachers enjoy the variety of activities on offer, including the different activities for consecutive grades – it's something the students look forward to and there's a progression of skills each year. They encourage team building and communication between children. We purposely put kids in activities who might not necessarily be in the same class as each other just to mix it up, just to build relationships and have different experiences.

Q: How have you seen your children grow as a result of being on an Educational Camp?

A: One of the main reasons why we run school camps is that it provides the opportunity to develop different skills that can't be done in a classroom. We see lots of kids, who struggle in an academic environment, shine in an outdoor environment! They realise they have they can have confidence and skills in a different area. It's very encouraging. It's why I love camp. The children also get to see each other in a different light and interact with each other on a different level. They get to see each other's strengths in different areas rather than just in a school room. The kids get an opportunity to just to enjoy being outdoors, have conversations, and build relationships with people that they might not normally don't sit next to in the classroom.

Q: How has camp helped your students explore and grow in their faith?

A: At school, we have our daily time in our classroom, our chapels and our Christian groups. But having the camp leaders talk to them about Jesus, share stories, and ask questions is really good. It's great that the students hear from someone else – someone young who they perceive as cool. They see that Christianity is not just for old people! After camp, a lot of the kids want to think about where their relationship with God is at and want to know how to read the Bible for themselves.

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Q: What is your experience as a teacher on camp?

A: Since the CRU leaders run our camp program and activities, it allows staff to participate and be alongside the children. There are great opportunities for conversations with children, relationship building, and enjoying experiences together. It's nice to take a backseat, and it's really good to get a perspective on children from a non-academic angle. Camps are also great for building relationships between staff because we get to have some downtime and have some fun together. That's important too - as a Head of School, I want to interact with my staff on a different level and not just always in a pressured situation, where we're talking about academics or the next thing that's due. Camp really helps with building those relationships.

CRU leaders run the program

Our trained and qualified leaders run the full program, from wake up to bed time! You'll rarely have sole responsibility for your students,* so you can focus on building rapport with students rather than having your attention drawn to running activities or meal times.



Comfortable accommodation

Teachers are accommodated in twin-share, ensuite rooms with linen provided.** We hope to make your stay away from home and family as pleasant as possible.



Flexible and fully-customisable camps

You will be assigned a dedicated Program
Coordinator who will work with you to develop a
custom camp program that will fulfil your school's
aims and outcomes. This same
Program Coordinator will also work with
the coordinating teacher to arrange the
administrative details for camp.

A few decades ago being a youth leader at churches, a key discussion point was always about what to call our youth group – which name would best attract young people? Pithy, groovy names that would attract hip, cool, teenagers to the group were regularly reviewed. Single syllable words like "Rage", "Hub" and "Glow" were required, as well as for the name of the venue: The Hub, The Shack, or The Room were also popular. The very Australian way of abbreviating or lengthening particular names was also important. (Of course, my common moniker has been "Ando".)

Over time, one name that has stuck has been the abbreviation for Crusaders - "CRU". However, the constancy with CRU has really been the constancy of the truths that sit behind its work: the opportunity for young people to hear of God's truth and hope in a changing world; a constant reminder for young people to hear the gospel of Jesus Christ – to lay a foundation for the relationship we may have with God. The capacity for truth and hope is crucial to CRU.

But CRU's constancy doesn't end there. CRU Educational Camps are constant in their striving to provide excellent outdoor education experiences that grow students in their resilience and personal development.

After 17 years of partnering with CRU Educational Camps for our school camps, I have experienced firsthand their commitment to working alongside schools to deliver camp programs that meet the unique needs of the school and its students.

CRU Educational Camps allow students to grow and learn in a fun, social and balanced environment.

At every camp, students are matured in their ability to overcome academic challenges at school, provided with opportunities for social development in a different environment, learn leadership and teamwork skills, and grow in their confidence. However, for Arden, the main benefit of these camps is simple – students can explore their faith in a safe environment. Many young people have become Christians or recommitted their faith through these camps.

Community is about interdependence, relying on constant renewal of personal relationships. Yet Louise Newman, Professor of Psychiatry at Melbourne University among others, finds it heartening that people pulled apart by the COVID-19 pandemic had tried to recreate a spirit of community and connection with others.

There is no greater example of real community than a CRU Camp for our young people. All CRU staff foster community with the students and teachers throughout camp as they sincerely seek to know them, look after them and guide them.

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CRU doesn't run camps with a one size fits all approach. They get to know your school, your staff and importantly the students, as if they were planning to spend the rest of the year with you.

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The leaders endeavour to meet the students where their needs are – CRU doesn't run camps with a one size fits all approach. This relationship building and servant leadership are concrete examples of what living a Christian life looks like, and makes a CRU Educational Camp so much more than purely a wonderful outdoor education experience. Every year at our Year 12 Valedictory Dinner, the highlight of any particular year for our Year 12 students in their learning journey is the CRU Camp that occurred that year!

CRU Educational Camps are unique. At Arden, education within a Christian worldview intersects beautifully with CRU promoting living within a Christian worldview.

The CRU Educational Camps that have been part of the fabric of Arden for many years have provided great support and impetus to the vibrant Christian ministry happening at our school.

It was a Year 4 CRU Educational Camp that was the genesis of our Junior School CRU Group. A group of boys, with no previous church or Christian background, individually made commitments to following Christ at the camp. The next week, they began meeting at lunchtime with the Chaplain, to read the Bible together and learn more about what it says. They invited other friends to join them; and the group continued to grow and extend to become the 'CRU Crew' group that continues to flourish in our primary campus today.

CRU Holiday Camps have also contributed to preparing our secondary students for life after school – particularly the HSC Study Camps, which have been a means for our students to invite their friends to Camp to study together, and also hear the gospel proclaimed clearly and relevantly.

Many of our Year 12 students have grown in their faith through these camps, strengthening them to face the challenges and competing claims to truth that they encounter in the world beyond school.

CRU provides more than just consistently wonderful outdoor education experiences. Their camps are personally designed to allow your students to flourish, meet the school's desired outcomes, and provide an authentic example of real community.








Camps tailored to your students

As we work with schools, we aim to sequence multiple camps in order to build on student outcomes over their years of schooling. Here are examples of different camp types and how they could be sequenced to give students differing and expanding experiences from Years K-12.

Years K-2

Daytime programs

A variety of day program experiences that gently introduce your students to external outdoor education experiences.



1 night introductory camp

Year 3

On site activities such as initiative games, bush walking and low ropes.





Year 4

2 nights at CRU Galston Gorge

On site activities with higher difficulty and challenge levels including rock climbing and abseiling.



Year 5

2 nights at CRU Lake Mac

An opportunity to work in teams while sailing on the lake. Investigate the indigenous history of Lake Mac and the Aboriginal Middens on the site.



Year 6

2 nights at Canberra

A curriculum camp including visits to Parliament House and The Australian War Memorial. Organised and run by our staff.

Year 7

Introduction to camping out

Students get a taste of camping outdoors, including staying in tents for one night at CRU Lake Mac's own camping area across the road from the main site.



Hike & camping journey

Students complete a 9km hike down into Galston Gorge and camp at Crosslands Reserve.



Sailing & kayaking journey

1 night spent in cabins, 2 nights spent camping, and a multi-craft water journey where campers switch between sea kayaks and sail boats as they journey around the lake.







Year 10

City adventure

An experience in groups through either Sydney or Newcastle city, where students have to rely on each other to complete challenges.



Year 11

Leadership & life skills

A conference style camp where students receive seminars and complete group activities to help them develop various leadership and life skills.



Year 12

Study skills

A conference style camp where students are given specific input into study skills and an opportunity to consider what life will look like beyond school.

These are just an example of the types of programs we can deliver, and most of these camps can be catered to different year groups. Our team is able to book camps for multiple year groups alongside each other, especially during Terms 2 and 3.
